

Message from the Board Chair and Interim Executive Director

In 2017/18, PWA celebrated its 30th anniversary. Over thirty years ago on May 11th, 1987 when James St. James, Raymond Bernard and Russell Almond signed the incorporation papers that created the Toronto People With AIDS Foundation, the possibility that PWA would have a 30th anniversary must have been unfathomable. Since that time no cure has been found, but life-saving medications have been discovered. Devastating stigma continues, but untransmittability with an undetectable viral load and aging with HIV are possible for most, but not all.

So much has changed in 30 years. And yet, most of the core reasons why Jim, Ray and Russ created PWA - stigma; social isolation; the need for practical supports; a chosen family to turn to - continue to be a reality for thousands of people living with HIV/AIDS in Toronto. In 2017/18, over 2,500 people living with HIV/AIDS came to PWA for just these reasons - food; financial assistance; support accessing the Ontario Disability Support Program; and support getting HIV meds. But also to get a haircut, a massage, to volunteer, and to feel connected and a part of a welcoming and healing community.

To honor our 30th anniversary, PWA held several key events organized by our 30th Anniversary Planning committee. The Committee, made up of clients, donors, volunteers and staff, coined the phrase the "Family of HIV" to celebrate what PWA has meant and continues to mean for so many. Highlights of the year included the 30th birthday party for PWA, our "Family of HIV" Annual General Meeting, the World AIDS Day Community Carnation Memorial and Red Ribbon Brigade, and our Bike Rally kick-off party. Hundreds of our "Family" members – Bike Rally participants, clients, community partners and supporters, donors, staff and volunteers – came together throughout the year to remind us of how bold, beautiful and resilient our family has been and continues to be.

In 2017/18 we also saw an incredible outpouring of hard work and dedication by our Bike Rally family - the crew, riders, team leads, steering committee, cochairs, and staff of our 19th annual fundraiser. Two hundred and fifty crew and riders raised close to \$900,000 resulting in one of the highest amount raised per participant in our history. Funds raised from the event touch every aspect of PWA's work, including the Financial Assistance program. Staff and volunteers

conducted a multi-year planning project engaging current, former and never-participated-before participants resulting in an exciting roadmap for the future of the Rally. The Bike Rally continued to be the lifeblood of PWA's ability to offer its critical support and services and to demonstrate how the Rally itself also provides a critical healing and welcoming space to those people living with and affected by HIV/AIDS who join it.

Early in the new fiscal year of 2018/19, Murray Jose-Boerbridge, PWA's longstanding Executive Director, said good-bye to PWA to pursue a new role as the Director of the Toronto HIV/AIDS Network. The change in leadership resulted in an opportunity for the agency to re-align its vision to the future with PWA's new strategic plan. Thanks to the agency's interim leadership team there has been no interruption to services or programs during this transition. The board recruitment's committee is working to ensure new leadership is in place before the end of the year.

Finally, as we ended the 2017/18 year and closed our 30th anniversary, a new vision for the future of PWA emerged from our strategic planning conducted last year – a vision to be the PHA Hub. As the PHA Hub, PWA will become a primary point of contact, community and support for people living with HIV/AIDS in Toronto. This new vision came from our clients, volunteers and staff, and also Bike Rally participants, community partners and donors – our full community and family. As we move forward from reflecting on our 30 past years, we excitedly anticipate the future as we implement PWA's new strategic plan to keep fulfilling our mission to enhance the health and well-being of people living with HIV/AIDS in Toronto.

30 Years of PWA

On May 11, 2018 the Toronto People With AIDS Foundation (PWA) embarked a year-long celebration in recognition of 30 years of service and meaningful engagement of people living with HIV and AIDS. In the early part of 1986 it became clear that poverty and social isolation were two grave problems facing people living with HIV/AIDS (PHAs). Jim St. James, a local figure and outspoken PHA "believed that PHAs would live longer if they didn't have the burden of financial stress and if they could be together to gain strength from one-another." On May 11th, 1987 Jim and fellow PHAs Raymond Barnard and Russell Almond became the founding directors of PWA. For 30 years thousands of men, trans-men, transwomen, women and children living with and affected by HIV and AIDS have counted on PWA and we have responded with compassion, understanding, and perseverance.

PWA's 30th Anniversary Planning Committee (page 4) – an enthusiastic collective of clients, staff, volunteers, and donors - were charged with identifying new and existing opportunities for celebration within PWA's annual operating program. We kicked off the celebrations at PWA in May 2017 and wrapped up an exhaustive year of initiatives at the ROM in May 2018. From Love Bowl to PWA's Friends For Life Bike Rally; Pride to World AIDS Day; volunteer recognition to client Holiday Bags; newsletters to tweets; and program evaluation to strategic planning – we honored our past, celebrated the present, and set the path for our future.

As HIV has transformed into a more manageable disease the needs of people living with HIV have become increasingly complex. PWA is emboldened to respond to the diverse needs of its stakeholders and if the past 30 years have taught us anything, it is that together, we can truly make a positive difference.

PWA's 30th Anniversary Planning Committee

In preparation for our 30 anniversary and to assist in creating meaningful and community engaging activities, PWA formed an anniversary planning committee involving clients, volunteers, donors, and staff.



The role of the Committee was is to provide guidance into the design and coordination of PWA's 30th anniversary activities. PWA has a long and rich history serving people living with HIV/AIDS; it was important to plan and implement unique ways to highlight PWA and its many years of service to the community.

Committee members brought a range of knowledge and history of engagement with PWA, the community, and the intersecting issues facing the many different communities of people living with HIV/AIDS in Toronto. The committees planning was guided and influenced by the values of Celebration and Remembrance, Community and Friendship, Knowledge and Awareness, Inclusivity and Meaningful Engagement, and Strength and Resilience.

The common thread uniting the group was a passion for making a positive difference for people living with HIV/AIDS in Toronto. We celebrated and remembered PWA's 30 years by incorporating anniversary activities into many of our annual events: Pride celebrations including the Parade and the Community Fair, PWA's Friends For Life Bike Rally, our Annual General Meeting, Love Bowl, High Heel Strut, and World AIDS Day Community Carnation Memorial. Specific 30th anniversary and new annual initiatives were developed and produced: 30th Anniversary Kick-Off and Wrap-Up events, World AIDS Day Red Ribbon Brigade, and PWA's Friends For Life Bike Rally leadership volunteers created the Thirty For Thirty 30-hour spin-a-thon.

Gareth Henry

PWA staff member, and international and community activist Gareth Henry was one of the many team members who contributed to PWA's 30th Anniversary Planning Committee. Gareth, who works tirelessly to help others, shares his inspiring story.

Gareth came to Canada in January of 2008 fleeing homophobic persecution from his native country, Jamaica. Early on he made it his mission to facilitate positive change by helping others escape persecution and at times, death. Because of his stance on social justice, he became a target of police brutality. He experienced a horrific beating by police in front of a mob of 300+ people including being gun butted several times and thrown to the ground. His call for justice after this gruesome attacked fell on deaf ears and he went into hiding as a result of threats he was receiving. It was not until police officers confronted him and told him they knew where he was hiding and that he will be killed, that he fled to Canada - a choice between life and death.

In Jamaica, young gay men live in sewers and on the streets living in poverty - some ravaged by HIV - because they cannot access needed health care and support. Because of this disparity and his own life-changing experiences, Gareth strongly believes that his native home needs to be held accountable for its horrific treatment of the LGBT community.

1993 PWA and ACT move to 399 Church St. PWA receives the first grant to a Canadian HIV/AIDS organization from MAC AIDS Fund. The AIDS Memorial in Cawthra Park (in 2014 renamed Barbara Hall Park) opens.

In 2012, Gareth's passion led him to join the staff at PWA. His excitement at the opportunity was a direct result of his passion for working in the HIV sector and finding ways to support individuals in realizing their full potential and living their lives to the fullest. Gareth began his career in the HIV sector at the age of 20, and considers it his calling to be of service to his community. A former co-chair of the advocacy group Jamaica Forum of Lesbians, All-Sexuals and Gays (J-FLAG), Gareth frequently helped people report anti-gay hate crimes to police. Alongside his duties

at PWA, he works for Rainbow Railroad Rainbow, a non-profit organization that helps relocate LGBT individuals experiencing persecution around

the world to travel to safety.

Gareth's commitment to help is global. His passion for facilitating positive change for others is such an important part of his life, it provides him with unending inspiration. As a result of his tireless activism and commitment to human rights, Gareth is currently featured in the Human Rights Museum in Winnipeg and the Refuge Canada Exhibit at the Canadian Immigration Museum in Halifax.

Gareth is the Interim Director of Programs and Services at PWA. He shares his Toronto home with his fiancé, also a conventional refugee.

The HIV and AIDS Legal Clinic Ontario (HALCO) is established in partnership with the ACT and the PWA Foundation. PWA continues to obtain co-op commitments for dedicated units for PHAs. Dr. Charles Roy publishes his ground-breaking research Living and Serving: Persons with HIV in the Canadian AIDS Movement.

1996 Sutherland Chan partners with PWA to provide the first student massage clinic for PHAs. New family of anti-retroviral drugs called protease inhibitors is approved in the US. Ontario begins Viral Load testing.

PWA's Friends For Life Bike Rally

To borrow from the proverb "it takes a village," for 19 years, a community of dedicated and caring individuals have come together to make positive change in the lives of people living with HIV and AIDS. On Sunday, July 30th, 2017 250 Riders and Crew departed Toronto on the Friends For Life Bike Rally, PWA's annual fundraiser.



Participants arrived in Port Hope after 110 km where, for 48 people, this was the end of their adventure. The second annual 1-Day Ride from Toronto to Port Hope proved memorable with participant celebrating success before a tearful departure back to Toronto.

The remaining 202 Riders and Crew continued

on their 6-day adventure, stopping in Adolphustown, Kingston, Johnstown, and Lancaster. On Friday, August 4th they arrived in Montreal, celebrating months of dedicated volunteerism, 6 days of adventure, and over \$897,000 raised.

The David Linton Spirit of the Bike Rally Award

David Linton (1964-2011) was the co-founder of PWAs Friends For Life Bike Rally and a long-time rider and supporter. As a past board member of Toronto People With AIDS Foundation

he was a long-time supporter of the agency. His commitment to improving the lives of people living with HIV/AIDS in our community was inspiring and his passion shaped a Bike Rally that has endured and continues to grow.

The 2017 Recipient, Alexander Wu, was honoured posthumously for his dedication and years of volunteer service to the Bike Rally as a rider, Steering Committee member, and PWA board member. His enthusiasm and commitment to building community continues to inspire.

PWA's Friends For Life Bike Rally Honours 30 Years of PWA

PWA's Friends For Life Bike Rally honoured the PWA as it marked 30 years of providing practical support programs to people living with HIV/AIDS in Toronto.

For 30 hours - representing one hour for each year of PWA's services - Riders, Crew, supporters and clients jumped on stationery bikes in Nathan Phillips Square. The event started at 6:00 A.M. on Monday, April 24 and concluding at 12-noon on Tuesday, April 25 - a remarkable event that brought the community together. Bike Rally participants and PWA staff, clients and volunteers helped raise awareness about HIV/AIDS and highlighted the essential programs that PWA has provided for many over its thirty year history, a remarkable commitment to people living with HIV/AIDS.


