STAFF CHANGES

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

Silvie Sylvester Wood was an extraordinary individual who brought joy and laughter wherever he went.




Dadri Anna Tannis was an energetic individual whose energy was transferrable to those around.

REFUGEES ON THE STREETS OF TORONTO!!



Toronto's at-capacity shelter system has been turning away refugees and asylum seekers since the beginning of June and referring them to federal programs, saying it needs more financial support from the federal government. However, many asylum seekers can't get federal help if their claims haven't been fully granted, leaving dozens of them stuck in limbo with nowhere to sleep.

PWA, along with several other civil society organizations, united together to raise their voices against the injustice of newcomers being forced to sleep on the streets, particularly in areas where refugees are stranded in Toronto. The members of the PWA family demonstrated their commitment to social equality and ensuring the well-being of all individuals within their community. By joining forces with other organizations, PWA expressed their solidarity and determination to address the pressing issue of homelessness and displacement, advocating for change and seeking solutions to provide a safe and secure environment for everyone, regardless of their background or status.






MISSION
